OUR HISTORY

St. Michael Special School was established in 1965 by Sr. Lillian McCormack of the School Sisters of Notre Dame with support from the Archdiocese of New Orleans to serve children and young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The location of the old St. Michael Parish was chosen because of its central accessibility. Just before the school opened, Hurricane Betsy made landfall. The rectory of St. Michael was destroyed, the beautiful church very badly damaged, properties all around battered, but the newly built St. Michael Special School stood untouched. God had his protective hand on us.

Since 1965, St. Michael Special School has been able to educate over 6,000 students with intellectual and developmental disabilities and minister to their families. This has only been possible with the support of the local community. There are many stories that will touch your heart. Our school has been blessed with dedicated teachers and staff who take care of our precious blue roses, so that they may blossom and become all God intended them to be.

LOWER SCHOOL

The Lower School provides a foundation for personalized learning with an emphasis in English Language Arts and Mathematics. Students (ages 6 to 15) are placed in age and developmentally appropriate self-contained classrooms for the majority of their academic day. In addition to literacy and numeracy, students also engage in art, music, adapted physical education, technology instruction, and inclusive social activities. Instruction in all classes meets the needs of the learner. through differentiation and small group instruction. As students grow to meet their full potential academically, a focus on self-responsibility, daily living skills, and social appropriateness support the student as they progress towards advancement and application of skills.













UPPER SCHOOL

Upper School serves students 16 to 21 years of age in a high school-like setting. Academic classes are departmentalized. Students are grouped by ability for core academic subjects and have the opportunity to deepen skills in additional classes: art, music, adaptive physical education, technology, cooking, industrial arts, community based instruction, and life skills. The focus of the academic program is to prepare graduates for their individual level of independence as they complete their schooling. Additional opportunities for independence are provided through extracurricular activities including Student Council, cheerleading, clubs based on interest, and intramural sports to support the development of the whole student.













EXPLORATION ACADEMY

Exploration Academy assists students with their transition to employment/volunteer opportunities within our New Orleans community. Students explore their career interests and develop the independent living skills that will help them to live and work in the community. The scaffolded program encourages students' participation in community training and job exploration at off campus sites at least twice a week; working towards the ultimate goal of release from the school program through job placement. The ideal applicant will be between the ages 18 to 25, have completed St. Michael's Upper School or a high school program of studies, and have a desire to participate fully in a community work setting.











JOY ACTIVITY CENTER

The Joy Activity Center serves St. Michael graduates who seek continued cognitive engagement, social activities, and personal responsibility in a safe, caring, Catholic environment. In addition to the daily group schedule, participants have the opportunity to continue their enrichment in cooking, crafts, computer, health and wellness, music, dance, sign language, and sports. Everyone in this program serves as an ambassador for the school with a variety of on and off campus responsibilities including campus work opportunities, community fundraiser projects, and cultural enrichment.
